Luca Bernardini is Associate Professor of Slavic Studies at the University of Milan. His research areas include cultural, literary and historical relationships between Italy and Slavic countries as well as between Poland and Muscovy, travel literature, Shoah studies and translation studies. He published editions and translated into Italian works by Polish authors such as Miron Białoszewski, Tadeusz Borowski, Jan Karski, Hanna Krall, Wisława Szymborska, and Adam Zagajewski.

Marina Ciccarini is Full Professor of Polish Language and Literature at the University of Rome "Tor Vergata". Her fields of research include text criticism and 16th-century Polish memoirs: 17th-century Russian-Polish comparative studies: the Polish literary canon and literature in late Baroque and Enlightenment eras; Polish romanticism, and 20th-century theatre and poetry. Among her publications are Ultimi roghi. Fede e tolleranza alla fine del Seicento: il caso di A.Ch. Belobockij (Armando Editore, Roma 2008) and Żart, inność, zbawienie. Studia z kultury i literatury polskiej (Neriton, Warszawa 2008). She has also translated and edited the following poetry collections: E. Lipska, L'occhio incrinato del tempo (Armando Editore, Roma 2013); E. Lipska, Il lettore di impronte digitali e altre poesie (Donzelli Editore, Roma 2017); M. Lebda, La cella reale (Ensemble, Roma 2018), and E. Lipska, Memoria operativa – L'amore in procedura di emergenza (Firenze 2022).

Lidia Grzybowska (PhD) works at the Jagiellonian University in Kraków. Her research interests include the history of medieval literature, medieval preaching, old literary theory, biblical exegesis, and pre-modern culture. Among her recent publications are Kazania de tempore i de sanctis Mikołaja z Błonia. Zarys monografii (Sermons de tempore and de sanctis by Mikołaj of Błonie. A monographic Study) (2020); Skąd wziął się w Krakowie traktat Franciszka Eiximenisa Ars praedicandi populo? Trzy możliwe drogi (How Francesc Eiximenis' Treatise Ars praedicandi populo Arrived in Cracow? Three possible ways), and "Annales Universitatis Paedagogicae Cracoviensis. Studia Historicolitteraria" 21 (2021), pp. 12-31.

Tomasz Kaliściak (PhD) is a Professor at the Institute of Literary Studies of the University of Silesia (Katowice). He is a literary scholar and historian of 19th-20th -century Polish literature, and is interested in broad research themes concerning modernity, including gender and sexual identities. He is the author of the following monographs: Katastrofy odmieńców (Queer Catastrophes,

2011) and *Płeć Pantofla. Odmieńcze męskości w polskiej prozie XIX i XX wieku* (Gender of the Henpecked Husband: Queer Masculinities in Polish Prose of the 19th and 20th Century, 2016), and the co-editor of *Biopolityka męskości* (Biopolitics of Masculinity, 2020) and *Dezorientacje. Antologia polskiej literatury queer* (Disorientations. Anthology of Polish Queer Literature, 2021).

Valentina Parisi holds a PhD in Slavic Studies from the University of Milan. She was awarded funding from the Istituto Italiano di Scienze Umane (SUM) in Florence (2009-2011) for a postdoctoral fellowship and spent a year as an EURIAS fellow at the Institute for Advanced Studies, Central European University (Budapest, 2012-2013) and at the Hanse-Wissenschaftskolleg (HWK) in Delmenhorst (Germany, 2014-2015). She is the author of the volume *Il lettore eccedente. Edizioni periodiche del samizdat sovietico, 1956-1990* (Bologna, Il Mulino, 2013). She has recently contributed to the *Oxford Handbook of Soviet Underground Culture* with the chapter *Infrastructures of Soviet Underground Culture*. She held a three-year research grant (2019-2022) at Pavia University. In 2022 she was awarded a three-month Paul Celan Fellowship at the Institute for Human Sciences in Vienna for a translation project on Zinaida Gippius's literary work. She is currently a Research Fellow at the University of Macerata.

Piotr Sobolczyk is Professor of Literary Theory and Queer Studies at the Institute of Literary Research, Polish Academy of Sciences (Warsaw). He has published seven books on Polish literature, including two in English – *Polish Queer Modernism* (2015) and *The Worldview - the Trope - and the Critic. Critical Discourses on Miron Białoszewski* (2018). He is also the author of two books on Miron Białoszewski and the co-founder and editor of "MiroFor", dedicated to Miron Białoszewski.

Stefania Spinelli studied Modern Languages and Literatures at the University of Turin. Her research interests include geocriticism and thematic approaches to literature, 20th century literature, and borderland literature. Her Master Thesis investigates Podlasie in contemporary Polish prose, focusing mainly on the works of Andrzej Stasiuk.
