The essays included in the second part of the book are less theoretical. Here the author discusses the history of various approaches to the genre, tries to characterise and categorize nineteenth century French autobiographies, writes about the problem of collaborative autobiography and finally turns his attention to various books of instruction for vould-be autobiographers.

The evolution of lejeune's interests, methods and style of writing, which can be discerned in the present volume, is discussed by Faul John Eakin in his introductory essay.

Eakin also describes the major critical accomplishments of Lejeune, compares his approach to that of other European and American critics and elucidates Lejeune's most important theories. Eakin's comprehensive survey serves as a useful supplement to the book.

The previous volumes published in the "Thcory and History of Literature" series of the University of Minusota Press, which included works by Ezvetan Todorov, Vladimiz Propp, Michail Bakhtin and other famous European critics, provoked a wide critical response in America. It is very likely that Lejeune's theories will prove equally stimulating, The full importance of the present volume should be recognized in the coming years, as American critics respond to Lejeune's ideas in their own books and essays.
